Spreading success in elder care

Innovative tool keeps elderly patients out of hospital

In Ontario, more than 75,000 people 65 years of age and over live in long term care (LTC) facilities and a high proportion of them visit emergency departments (ED) for additional care. However, once LTC residents are transferred to an ED they are at risk for hospital acquired complications such as delirium, pressure ulcers and falls.

Marilyn El Bestawi, a senior healthcare executive with experience in geriatrics knew that keeping LTC residents out of EDs could combat preventable deterioration in health status. Through participation in the EXTRA program, she developed a novel tool called PREVIEW-ED® to help staff predict the types of declines in health status that require the elderly to visit EDs. By arming LTC staff with the tool, El Bestawi provided them with a means of identifying early signs and symptoms of decline – and preventing ED visits through timely intervention.

Why it matters

Keeping the elderly out of hospital is an important strategy for preserving their health. More than that, by preventing ED visits, healthcare systems can save significant financial resources.

Impact

Results were impressive. Over the project's initial three months, the pilot facility reported a 57 percent decrease in transfers to the ED associated with pneumonia, urinary tract infections, dehydration and congestive heart failure for the residents who participated in the project. It is estimated that if the tool were implemented throughout the Toronto Central Local Health Integration Network, savings would amount to \$500,000. Scaled provincially, the potential savings would be roughly \$6.25 million annually.
